This month we celebrate and recognize our 2023 Roy and Glenda Griffin Eagle Scout Class. All 68 Scouts that earned their Eagle Scout Rank are being honored for their accomplishments at the annual Eagle Scout Reception. The class is named after South Texas Council executive board members Roy and Glenda Griffin for their lifetime of exceptional service to Scouting.

Roy and Glenda have served in the field as Venturing Crew Advisors, in numerous district committee positions, and currently serve on the South Texas Council Executive Board. Roy is a past council president and Glenda served as an advisor to the Venturing Officers Association. They are generous Friends of Scouting Supporters and are members of the McIver Furman Legacy Society.



In 2023 over 19,000 community service hours were recorded through Eagle Rank service projects, the labor value of these hours is over \$400,000! The top 10 Eagle Rank service projects highlighting their impact in our communities along with the awarding of the Glenn and Melinda Adams Eagle Service Project of the Year Award will be presented this month.

Our Scouts are making an impact in their neighborhoods and communities every day, their commitment to be helpful at all times is amazing. When our Scouts recite the oath and law we sometimes wonder if they are truly understanding the words, but I know they do when I see the Eagle Scout service hours alone, not counting all the service hours for other ranks and special projects our Scouts perform every day.

Changes to BSA Fees

Effective **April 1, 2024**, the **BSA will eliminate the \$25 one-time joining fee** for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting. The BSA will implement the following national membership fees, which were approved by the National Executive Committee in addition to the council \$24 program fee.

\$85/yr for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting participants (\$5 increase)

\$65/yr for all adult volunteers (\$5 increase)

\$25/yr for Merit Badge Counsèlors (No chánge in fee. This fee is for Merit Badge Counselors who are not already registered volunteers)

\$50/yr for Exploring participants youth & adults (No change in fee)

\$100/yr unit renewal/affiliation fee (No change in fee)

\$15/yr for Scout Life magazine (No change in fee)

Leadership Selection

The Boy Scouts of America takes great pride in the quality of our adult leadership. Being a leader in the BSA is a privilege, not a right. The quality of the program and the safety of our youth members call for high-quality adult leaders.

The adult application requests background information that

should be checked by the unit committee or the chartered organization before accepting an applicant for unit leadership. While no current screening techniques exist that can identify every potential child abuser, we can reduce the risk of accepting a child abuser by learning all we can about an applicant for a leadership position—his or her experience with children, why he or she wants to be a Scout leader, and what discipline techniques he or she would use.

The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) has a multilayered adult leader selection process that includes criminal background checks administered by a nationally recognized third party and other screening efforts. Click <u>here</u> for information on the selection process.

March Safety Moment - Risk Assessment

The Guide to Safe Scouting asks us to assess risks for activities that are not covered by the BSA program.

This begs the question: How do I assess risks?

GENERAL INFORMATION

The BSA National Health and Safety Committee has developed the following tools to help assess risks in Scouting:

- The enterprise analysis tool is primarily used to record, assess, and manage council-wide risks. The risks
 identified using this tool should be serious enough to jeopardize council operations. This tool may cover
 many areas, such as financial, legal, or liability risks.
- Program hazard analysis is used mainly for program areas within camps or high-adventure bases. It
 covers specific risks to the program areas. This tool has a defined way of assessing probability and
 severity of risks.
- Safety checklists are used for small events or campouts. Checklists provide a body of knowledge for running Scouting activities safely. Like an airline pilot reviewing a checklist before takeoff, these tools help to make sure critical safeguards are in place for a specific Scouting activity.
- The Safety PAUSE (Pause, Assess, Understand, Share, and Execute) process stresses the importance of
 a last-minute safety check in the field. By encouraging each Scout or adult leader to pause and reflect on
 the tasks at hand just before beginning, you have an opportunity to take necessary precautions to prevent
 any present or potential hazards. This is not a stand-alone tool. A formal risk assessment should be done
 first, such as a safety checklist or a program hazard analysis (PHA).
- You can reference the Enterprise Risk Management Committee Guidebook to learn exactly how to use
 these tools. Reach out to Scouters in your units or councils with backgrounds in risk management or
 safety. Doing risk assessments is likely part of their everyday routine. With their know-how and these tools,
 risk assessing can be easily accomplished.



Plan for Spring Recruitment!

It is never too early to think about expanding your unit! Now is the time to start thinking about recruiting those families that might have missed joining during the fall season.

Here are some items your unit can take advantage of:

- Den Open Houses can help grow your den size. Strive for a goal of 8 youth minimum per den.
- Troops can visit with fifth graders and invite them to the Scout BSA program in March, possibly even creating a brand-new patrol for scouts. Do not forget about Arrow of Light scouts that will need a troop!
- Crews, Ships, and Posts can visit eighth graders and invite them to join after their fourteenth birthday or after completing the eighth grade.
- All units can host an 'invite-a-friend' event and invite families around the community to a bowling party, barbecue, or other fun community gathering.

School recruitments are a great way to bring in extra scouts from the area. If you already did a recruitment in the fall, don't hesitate to do another one in the spring -- it is a great opportunity to get more people involved in scouting.

Remember, membership fees cover 12 months, so don't hesitate to recruit no matter what time of year it is.

2. Does it support Scouting's values?

While "fun" is an essential element of Scouting, it isn't one of its values.

3. Is it age appropriate?

4. Is it prohibited or unauthorized?

If in doubt, check it out: Prohibited and Unauthorized Activities

Cub Scouts are getting a major upgrade!

5 years of hard work and research, coupled with a close look at how the Cub Scout program is actually used by the, 'boots on the ground' has lead to a revamp of the curriculum. The new program is fun, simple, and easy for leaders (seasoned or new) to deliver Scouting in a meaningful way to Cubs.

The program hasn't lost anything. In fact, just the opposite is true. The underutilized parts of the program, (like awards) have been redesigned into elective adventures where they will be closer at hand for leaders, and be offered to Cubs more regularly.

A few key highlights:

- The required adventures have been realigned to create an organized and systematic path from rank to rank.
- Tons of elective adventures have been added to keep challenging Scouts throughout the year.
- Many of the traditional Scout activities like camping, fishing, biking and swimming have been added as elective adventures at each rank to encourage Scouts to keep doing the things Scouting is known for.
- The program has been realigned so each grade level has their own rank.

These exciting renovations are only a sampling of the great things to come. Your Scouts may not notice the upgrades, but volunteer Scout leaders will definitely notice how much easier it is to run a den meeting, and new parents will be able to understand the program with ease.
